

QUEEN ELIZABETH II

Queen Elizabeth II was born Elizabeth Alexandra Mary by caesarean section at 2:40 a.m. on April 21, 1926, the first child of Prince Albert, Duke of York (later King George VI) and his wife, Elizabeth. Her father was the second son of King George V and Queen Mary, and her mother was the youngest daughter of Scottish aristocrat Claude Bowes-Lyon, 14th Earl of Strathmore and Kinghorne. Elizabeth's only sibling was Princess Margaret, born in 1930.

Princess Elizabeth was third in line of succession to the throne, behind her uncle, Edward, Prince of Wales, and her father. Although her birth generated public interest, she was not expected to become queen, as the Prince of Wales was still young, and many assumed he would marry and have children of his own. In 1936, when her grandfather, George V, died and her uncle Edward succeeded, she became second in line to the throne after her father. Later that year, Edward abdicated after his proposed marriage to divorced socialite Wallis Simpson provoked a constitutional crisis. Elizabeth's father became king, and she became heiress presumptive.

In 1943, at the age of 16, Elizabeth undertook her first solo public appearance on a visit to the Grenadier Guards. Two years later Elizabeth made her first overseas tour, when she accompanied her parents through southern Africa. During the tour, in a broadcast to the British Commonwealth on her 21st birthday, she pledged: "I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong".

Elizabeth met her future husband, Prince Philip of Greece and Denmark in 1934. After another meeting in 1939, Elizabeth - though only 13 years old - fell in love with Philip. They married on 20 November 1947 at Westminster Abbey. They are second cousins once removed through King Christian IX of Denmark and third cousins through Queen Victoria.

The marriage was not without controversy: Philip had no financial standing, was foreign-born (though a British subject), and had sisters who had married German noblemen. He was a prince without a home or kingdom and even Elizabeth's mother was reported to have opposed the union initially, though in later life she told her biographer that Philip was "an English Gentleman".

Elizabeth gave birth to her first child, Prince Charles in November 1948, and a second child, Princess Anne in 1950.

King George VI's health declined during 1951, and in early 1952 Elizabeth and Philip set out for a tour of Australia and New Zealand by way of Kenya. On 6th February, whilst in Kenya, Prince Phillip broke the news to the new queen of the death of her father. When asked to choose a regal name; she replied "Elizabeth, of course".

Despite the death of Queen Mary only ten weeks before, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth went ahead on 2 June 1953.

The ceremony in Westminster Abbey was televised for the first time, and the coverage was instrumental in doubling the number of television licences to 3 million, and many of the more than 20 million British viewers watched television for the first time in the homes of their friends or neighbours.

Elizabeth's coronation gown was commissioned from Norman Hartnell and embroidered on her instructions with the floral emblems of Commonwealth countries. English Tudor rose, Scots thistle, Welsh leek, Irish shamrock, Australian wattle, Canadian maple leaf, New Zealand silver fern, South African protea, lotus flowers for India and Ceylon, and Pakistan's wheat, cotton and jute.

Elizabeth's pregnancies with Princes Andrew and Edward in 1959 and 1963, respectively, mark the only times she has not performed the State Opening of the British Parliament during her reign.

Elizabeth has reigned for 60 years. In that time she has witnessed many changes including the ongoing transformation of the British Empire into the Commonwealth of Nations;

In 1956, French Prime Minister Guy Mollet and British Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden discussed the possibility of France joining the Commonwealth. The proposal was never accepted, and the following year France signed the Treaty of Rome, which established the European Economic Community, the precursor of the European Union;

The Suez crisis in 1956, and in 1957 she opened the 23rd Canadian Parliament, becoming the first monarch to do so;

In 1961 she toured Cyprus, India, Pakistan, Nepal, Iran and Ghana. Even a press report that extremists within the Quebec separatist movement were plotting the Queen's assassination did not stop her from visiting Canada;

The 1960s and 1970s saw an acceleration in the decolonisation of Africa and the Caribbean; over 20 countries gained independence; and in 1970 she took her first royal walkabout, meeting ordinary members of the public during a tour of Australia and New Zealand; In 1977 Elizabeth marked the Silver Jubilee of her accession. During the 1981 Trooping the Colour ceremony, six shots were fired at the Queen from close range as she rode down The Mall on her horse. It was later discovered the shots were blanks;

In July 1981 the Queen celebrated the wedding of her eldest son, Charles, to Lady Diana Spencer. It was around this time that intense media interest in the opinions and private lives of the royal family began to occur;

In 1991, in the wake of the Gulf War, Elizabeth became the first British Monarch to address a joint session of the United States Congress.

In a speech on 24 November 1992, to mark the 40th anniversary of her accession, the Queen called 1992 her *annus horribilis*. In March, her second son Prince Andrew, Duke of York and his wife Sarah, separated. In April her daughter Anne, Princess Royal, divorced her husband Captain Mark Phillips. In October on a state visit to Germany, angry demonstrators in Dresden threw eggs at her, and in November, Windsor Castle suffered severe fire damage. Finally, in December Charles and Diana formally separated.

In 2002, Elizabeth marked her Golden Jubilee as queen. Her sister died in February and her mother in March, and the media speculated as to whether the Jubilee would be a success. As in 1977, there were street parties and commemorative events, and monuments were named to honour the occasion. A million people attended each day of the three-day main Jubilee celebration in London, and the enthusiasm shown by the public for Elizabeth was greater than many predicted.

On 20th March 2008, at the Church of Ireland St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, the Queen attended the first Maundy service held outside of England and Wales. At the invitation of Irish President Mary McAleese, in May 2011 the Queen made the first state visit to the Republic of Ireland by a British Monarch.

She is scheduled to open the 2012 Summer Olympics on 27th July and the Paralympics on 29th August in London. Her father, George VI opened the 1948 London Olympics, and her great-grandfather, Edward VII opened the 1908 London Olympics.

She has demonstrated support for inter-faith relations, and has met with leaders of other religions. She is the patron of over 600 charities and other organisations. Her main leisure interests include equestrianism and dogs, especially her Pembroke Welsh Corgis.

In the 1950s, as a young woman at the start of her reign, Elizabeth was depicted as a glamorous "fairytale Queen".

On 2nd June 2012 when the country celebrates her 60 years on the throne she will still be our fairytale Queen. She is the longest-lived and second-longest-reigning monarch of the United Kingdom, and does not intend to abdicate.

She is, above all, a woman who has kept her promise when she declared on her 21st birthday, 65 years ago: **"I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong"**.

QUEEN'S HALL, WATTON

Extract from "Watton Through The Ages" by George Jessup

In October 1952 Watton Parish Council called a meeting to consider what would form a suitable commemoration of the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. A large majority favoured the erection of a Public Hall as there was a long standing need for such an amenity in Watton. A committee was appointed and quickly embarked on their formidable task of providing a Public Hall and the subsidiary task of organising Coronation Festivities in the town.

Within a year a suitable site had been purchased and the idea of using an existing steel hangar frame as the mainstay of the building was adopted and negotiations for such a frame commenced. A hangar was purchased on December 29th 1953 and in three weeks was dismantled and brought to Watton for cleaning and painting. Plans for the Hall having been approved by all the authorities concerned, the boundary wall, fronting Norwich Road, was breached and an entrance cut to the site on April 5th 1954.

Work on felling 18 trees, bulldozing out roots and excavating for building foundations preceded rapidly and by August 1954 the hangar frame was erected. Having complied with the necessary conditions for obtaining a Ministry of Education grant, notification was received from the Ministry during September that a grant of £ 1,762 would be paid by instalments, providing that the work was done by voluntary labour.

Electricity was installed and work proceeded under floodlights during the winter of 1954-55 and by June 1955 the walls were up to window level and in July the building was roofed. Work was carried out inside the hall during the next winter and by January the concrete roof over the entrance hall and balcony was completed and the stage and ceiling joists fixed. A month later the ceiling was finished, the walls plastered and plans made to open the Hall on November 1st 1956.

During April, May and June the sprung dance floor, balcony and staircase was proceeded with and connection made with the public sewage system, thereby completing the main features of the construction programme. From July on many smaller jobs were carried out to ensure a reasonable state of completion by November 1st.

In completing this exceptionally fine hall which measures 105 feet in length by 36 feet in width, the original committee and everyone who gave their time and money, both during its erection and in maintaining it since, are to be congratulated and everyone in the town and district owe them a great debt of gratitude.

So Watton's new Queen's Hall was officially opened on 1st November 1956 by Lady Bacon who was accompanied by her husband, Sir Edmund, the Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk.

The Diamond Jubilee weekend will culminate with a day of celebrations in central London, including a service at St Paul's Cathedral followed by two receptions, a lunch at Westminster Hall, a Carriage Procession to Buckingham Palace and finally a Balcony appearance and Flypast.

60 YEARS OF PENTECOSTALISM IN WATTON

1952: The **Assemblies of God Church** was meeting in the 'Upper Room' an attic room in Middle Street with low ceilings, lit by gas lamps and heated with a tortoise stove, accessed only by a narrow twisty flight of steps. The minister was **Pastor J Quantril**.

1974: **Mr. Austin**, a farmer from Threxton became Pastor.

1977: The Church moved into it's current building in Dereham Road.

1986: In 1986 Mr. Austin retired as Pastor, and **Mr. Les Bibby** was appointed in his place.

1988: On 9th April 1988 **Mr. Chris Pye** was inducted as Pastor, Chris, a farmer from Ovington, was a relatively inexperienced pastor, but had a strong call of God on his life to work in Watton.

1991: **Watton Community Church** held its first service in Watton as Watton Christian Fellowship in May 1991; The services were as a result of a prophetic word spoken by Paul Randerson, the pastor of Breckland Christian Fellowship, Swaffham, and under his direction. Watton Community Church eventually became completely independent under its leader, **Pastor Roger Pawsey**.

1992: A portable Baptistry was put up in the Assemblies of God Church building, and a **joint Baptism** was held with Watton Community Church, who had recently been planted in the town and had subsequently taken AoG status. 15 people from the two Churches were baptised altogether, including many young people. This was the first baptism in the town in living memory and also the first time that the two Churches had worked together.



1996: Watton Community Church joined the Fellowship of Assemblies of God, part of the world's second largest Christian movement. Also in 1996 pastor Roger Pawsey was inducted as a full status minister, with world-wide recognition, at an ordination service during Britain's first joint Pentecostal churches conference.

2000: On 1st January 2000, at the stroke of midnight, amidst great celebration, the two Churches became one, a new Church for a new Millennium! It was renamed **Watton Pentecostal Church**, a part of River Ministries (Norfolk) and both memberships were invited to be part of the new church. Pastor Chris Pye and Rev. Roger Pawsey, became the new Pastors of Watton Pentecostal Church. The two Church Councils joined, to make a strong ministry team, to enable the new vision to be worked out.




